Our take

The vision statement lacks prioritization for the conservation of nature. I suggest updating the vision statement to: "Alberta's parks protect and conserve healthy, diverse, and ecologically resilient landscapes, and inspire people to discover, value, protect and enjoy the natural world and the cultural benefits it provides for current and future generations."

Our take

Alberta's parks and protected areas system will have greatly expanded across the province, playing a crucial role in addressing the climate and biodiversity crises. The parks system will achieve long-term conservation of nature, as evidenced by increasing biodiversity trends and recovery of species at risk.

All natural regions (boreal, shield, foothills, grassland, parkland, and Rocky Mountains) will be well represented within the system. Indigenous-led management of parks and protected areas will be prevalent and will actively advance reconciliation. The parks system will also provide equitable opportunities for people to connect and learn about nature through low-impact recreation and tourism.

Guiding Principles

Guiding Principles were first introduced in the 2009 Plan for Parks to help address challenges and navigate decisions involving diverse and sometimes competing needs in Alberta's parks. The following Guiding Principles are proposed for the new Plan:

Accountability

Albertans are informed and engaged on park issues. Decision making and reporting on progress is transparent, accurate and readily available.

Equitable Access

Parks are inviting, safe, inclusive and accessible – regardless of who you are or where you live.

Reconciliation

Parks are welcoming and vital spaces for modern and traditional Indigenous cultural activities.

Sustainability

Current and future generations can visit, be inspired by, and support continued conservation and access to parks.

Our take

I support equitable access to the parks system. Increased access to any park should be carefully considered with respect to its impact on nature and the conservation purposes of the park. Not all places need to be accessed. Expanding the park system would allow for increased campsite availability, while achieving nature conservation objectives.

Reconciliation

Alberta's parks play an important role in supporting Indigenous peoples as they practice traditional land uses, including the exercise of First Nation Treaty rights and Métis harvesting practices.

Alberta's Parks is committed to working with Indigenous communities and organizations to advance reconciliation in parks.

Our take

There is no reason to limit the options for Indigenous reconciliation in this question to three options. All actions are important.

I support creation of policy to encourage and enable Indigenous-led conservation initiatives, including Indigenous Protected and Conserved Areas, and co-management (not just collaborative management) of parks.

Sustainability

Sustainable recreation and camping opportunities ensure parks can be enjoyed by current and future generations. Maintaining affordability for a financially stable parks system is critical. Costs to deliver services, programs and park facilities and conservation actions (e.g., invasive species management) continue to increase.

Currently, partnerships play an important role in delivering park programs and services. There may be other opportunities to explore ways to ensure access to parks is maintained for generations to come.

Our take

Robust government funding for the conservation of nature and for low-impact recreation opportunities should be spending priorities. Parks provide invaluable ecosystem services that benefit all Albertans (clean water and air, flood and drought mitigation, climate resilience, fish and wildlife habitats) and mitigate the need for more costly investments in infrastructure. The Alberta Parks Steward system was an excellent program for engaging Albertans in park stewardship and opportunities to revitalize the program could be considered.

Our take

Enjoying healthy, intact natural spaces is the primary reason for visiting parks and protected areas. Therefore, all recreational activities should be considered for their compatibility with the long-term health of ecosystems and wildlife. Activities that emphasize quiet, low-impact recreation should be prioritized. Activities that have a negative impact on efforts to conserve and protect nature should be avoided.

Our take

The expansion of the parks and protected areas network should be the top priority for the Plan for Parks. Expanding the parks network is an excellent way to conserve nature, advance reconciliation, improve nature education, and provide opportunities for outdoor recreation for all Albertans.

Improving Legislation

Alberta's <u>Provincial Parks Act</u> is one of the oldest pieces of parks legislation in Canada, first established in 1930 and most recently amended in 2000. Legislation and its associated regulations impact how parks are developed, managed and the rules visitors must follow.

With increasing pressures and a growing population of park visitors, there is a need to explore how this legislation can meet new challenges. This will ensure Alberta's parks are effectively managed for current and future generations.

Legislation and its regulations provide guidance around specific activities and restrictions in provincial parks including recreational activities like boating, camping, day use, horseback riding, fishing and hunting. They establish rules around waste management, fire prevention, quiet hours, pets, motor vehicle use, fireworks, cannabis and liquor consumption.
